Incivility can close minds and foster actions that are counterproductive to learning, thus increasing risks for both staff and patients. This is a must read for anyone involved in OR practicum, or those interested in creating safe and supportive learning environments to improve the educational outcomes and professional development of perioperative nurses.

In our second article, Yaquelin Mustelier Douanes presents a research tool for validating nursing intervention protocols for outpatient surgery for patients with anorectal diseases. For this population, perioperative nurses can have a positive impact on the outcomes of day surgery by providing standardized care. Let this tool guide you through complex surgical pathways and help make surgical environments familiar, so you can focus on providing person-centred care that enhances your patients' experiences.

Our third article also looks at the importance of standardized care. Janelle Head suggests little comprehensive research into standardized outpatient total hip arthroplasty has been done in Canadian hospitals and surgical centres. Head looks at the

evidence out there about clinical standards and pathways, the criteria organizations use to choose patients, the many facets of supports in the home after surgery, the dynamics of the healthcare team, and how much influence perioperative nurses have on the outcomes.
